





Ngcolosi, the love of MaZulu's life

On the 14th of August 2020, viewers were in for a shock when Ngcolosi was gunned down, marking the exit of actor Tony Kgoroge from the show, meaning that MaZulu's husband was no more.

MaZulu is now broken, in despair, and grieving a love she always tried to protect. But, in the real world, a different story was being told.


When asked what it was like working alongside Tony, Leleti only had kind words to

offer, "Working with Tony was a journey in itself. It's always a good challenge to work with an experienced professional who's been doing this for years. We got to know each other, and when we had to bring our A-game every day, it became easy for both of us. Working with Tony was beautiful."

Down memory lane

The year 2018 was when the story of Imbewu gripped the nation for the first time and witnessed the character of MaZulu caught in an





entanglement of sorts from the get-go.
With just over 30 years in the acting industry, Leleti still keeps viewers glued to their screens with her outstanding performance.
In a hospital scene where Ngcolosi is confirmed dead, Leleti delivers a jaw-dropping and heart-wrenching moment that only a seasoned actress can deliver.
When asked what type of preparation goes into a hefty scene, the actress had this to say:

"Preparing for a scene, especially an emotional one is hard. I start from the evening before, so fortunately when I have such scenes my family understands because, unfortunately, I go back to thinking about sad things that happened in my life long ago and I relive the moment. What's more difficult is to come out from that moment. However, you need to, because you've got other scenes that require you to be happy. This makes it difficult not to take your work home."

SENSATION A glimpse into MaZulu's wardrobe

MaZulu's wardrobe is something that one can only glance at with admiration. Leleti describes the character's wardrobe as classy, elegant statement wear.

The process of selecting MaZulu's ward-robe is an involved one. The Creative Director and Wardrobe HOD create a detailed guideline to ensure that the outfits are consistent with the character.

The wardrobe is selected with precision and based on what the character is going through in a particular storyline.

Mood and colour palette are crucial and must blend with the wardrobe choice. It has to match all of the above - especially the character's emotional state.

We caught up with Mercedes De Bruyn, the Wardrobe Mistress on Imbewu's set, and here's what she had to say.










"We source fabrics across the country and find inspiration for styles while keeping up with fashion shows and trends."

"I pull out all the scenes for every block to establish what the character would need. We source fabrics across the country and find inspiration for styles while keeping up with fashion shows and trends. We find a style and combine that with the character's traits. Once the fabrics are sourced, Phiwa Goqo (Garment Designer) and I decide which fabric would suit the style we want best."

"Phiwa then draws up a pattern and sews the garment for a first fitting. After adjustments, we do a final fitting and then source accessories to match the new outfit. We look at shoes, bags, earrings, necklaces, and belts to compliment the outfit. The complete garment then gets placed for a particular scene."












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


CINDY MAHLANGU



NQOBILE SIPANLA

South Africa's most loved and hated TV villain

Marking her debut on the show with only one agenda on her mind, the character of Thokozile was set to be a villain from the get-go. Nqobile Sipamla landed on our screens, and we knew we would have an intense love-hate relationship with her.

Although Nqobile is an actual sweetheart in real life, she plays Thokozile so so well. Let's dive into what it takes to play a villain.

How different is the character of Thokozile from Nqobile?

Well, I can be reserved at times, but those close to me know that I have a quirky and crazy sense of humour and that I'm actually really playful, loving, protective and energetic. Firstly, Thokozile is older than I am, so her life experience differs from mine in many ways, she is far more poised and calculated, she is also a bold extrovert who doesn't let anything stand in her way. Nqobile, on the other hand, has learned to laugh at herself and not take herself too seriously.



I am doing that now more than ever because it hasn't only been liberating, it has also helped me deal with my imperfections and life's ups & downs and helped me grow as a human being and an artist. I always want to impact those around me positively, so I take great pride in my work and am quite protective of my loved ones. I try very hard to remain down to earth, do good, and build genuine relationships and connections.

Something else that makes us different is that music is a very big part of me, of my processes for introspection and healing and so I express a lot in song. I like fast cars; I love animals and I love children. I'm passionate about education and learning new skills.

In a nutshell, I'm an excitable, headstrong person who's passionate about the arts industry, loves to laugh and give my best shot in everything I do.

Another big difference between Thokozile and Nqobile is that I don't, nor do I condone, using any form of dark magic to influence any circumstances of my life. I think Thokozile's storyline helped inform those of us who may not have been aware of the vast difference and necessary distinction between African methods or beliefs behind traditional spirituality, customs and healing and dark magic.

I actually appreciate the lesson this character is teaching about our values, relationships and choices as people.



How have you found playing the role of a villain?

Thokozile is a complex character, she's nothing short of a storm. She requires a totally different kind of presence and performance delivery, which I haven't really tapped into before. With her background and introduction being so loaded, it requires precision from me mentally, emotionally and physically in preparation, so I've been learning a lot about detail and I'm also trying to make brave choices as an actor. One of the other things Thokozile's character is teaching me is how to master my emotions on a whole new level in order to be able to portray her as the villain she is.

That has involved me absorbing new information at a pretty fast pace. Then finding ways to interpret and use it most believably and authentically to serve the story and the character. I have gained much inspiration from conversations with my own loved ones, my family, our team of directors, my generous cast members and even people I have met previously, because I really hoped to make Thokozile as well rounded a character as possible (as I do with every role I play).



I am also fortunate to be surrounded by some powerful TV & film practitioners behind the scenes, so I have found this journey to be a collaborative effort that has been so enriching and fun in its own way. I am grateful to Grapevine and e.tv for their faith in me."

What are your lockdown diaries? How do you keep yourself busy from home?

"Being a freelance performer automatically pushed me into doing a lot of work and preparation from home from the very beginning of my career. Establishing work routines and finding myself in different working environments and conditions became a norm for me.


This period has allowed me to be even more innovative with my space, which is always an exciting exercise.

Lockdown has allowed me to re-evaluate and improve on my time management, becoming proactive about goals that I set out for myself. Although I am a carefree spirit, I have learned how important it is to love myself and be kind to myself. So I have become more precious with my privacy, emotional, mental/spiritual and physical health than I was before because choosing what I allow into my life is part of maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

#ENOUGH Shythm CityENOUGH Siving a voice to those who need it



South Africa is rated amongst the nations with the highest number of reported Gender-Based Violence (GBV) cases. These statistics are similar to that of countries at war. Given the importance of this social matter, Rhythm City took a stand and joined the conversation to help draw awareness to this issue through its storyline.

#EnoughIsEnough is an initiative that aims to empower victims of GBV to stand up against the actions of their perpetrators. The campaign aims to educate abusers by showing them that their actions are wrong, unlawful and should not be deemed or accepted as normal.

Rhythm City showcased a storyline centered on domestic violence and gained insight into how the story unfolded on air. We take a look at the talent that portrayed the characters involved.

Reshoketšwe Kekana who plays Dikeledi (the abused) on the show stated that "In order to play Dikeledi to her truest form, I had to have an open mind and not have a biased perception of GBV, which would cloud my judgement on Dikeledi's journey with abuse. I've learnt so much about GBV itself through this storyline.

I've also learned that we as women need to find our voice and be confident in it, once you notice the signs of GBV my sister, mother, and aunt, as hard as it is, leave before it's too late."

Playing the part of the abuser, Abe
Pupunyane aka Hammer noted, "I
have learned that it is a sad reality,
that women are being abused. It has
also helped me to appreciate
women more and to highlight that
the problem lies with us men.
Furthermore, I also learned that
women are stuck in these situations
and that it's a constant struggle for
them to leave.


We need to take a stand to prevent this from continuing. We are hoping that this initiative will educate people of all genders that any physical violence is unlawful and wrong and one should never be afraid to stand up and leave.
